Smithdon High School Year 7 Catch up Report

<u>Context</u>

The government is now providing funding (£500 per student) for students who did not achieve the standard score of at least 100 in English or Maths at KS2. In 2017-18, Smithdon received approximately £11 500 and a similar figure is expected for this academic year. The money is not provided so that students make progress. That should happen in a school without additional funding. The aim of the additional funding is to provide accelerated progress so closing the gap with the rest of the cohort.

Identification.

The money has been predominantly spent on staffing (including the use of a HLTA working with year 7 withdrawal group students in the Maths Department) and resourcing support through our centre for Learning support. We have:

- Invested in Maths Watch and My Maths

- Invested in supporting the Accelerated Reading programme, including buying more high interest/ low reading age short reads to engage those who are catch up readers

- Invested in training staff to support the Accelerated Reader programme

- Withdrawn select groups of students into CLS to boost their learning - Established intervention groups for reading and spelling during registration time

- Improvements in attendance
- Students gaining ATL grades of 1 and 2
- Students enjoying school

Successes of the 2017-18 Strategy

Average attendance for the catch-up group was 96.1%.74% of the cohort had attendance above 96%. Only one child had attendance below 90%

84% of the ATLs met the school's expectation
