Accelerated Reader

"The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." Dr. Seuss

If there is one universal truth about reading it is the above quotation from the eminent Dr. Seuss. It is, quite simply, a fact. If you read a lot, you will learn a lot, and with that knowledge, find so many routes that begin to open up to you in life.

It is with this belief that at Smithdon we encourage students to read. We encourage them to read for meaning, to learn to decode and identify key ideas in texts, but also to read for enjoyment to find pleasure in departing to different worlds from the classroom or the comfort of their own home.

Students in Years 7 and 8 take part in the Accelerated Reader Programme, which focuses on reading for meaning. Students are encouraged to quiz on the books they have read and use these quizzes to celebrate successes, while also setting goals for themselves. These quizzes are designed to help students recall key information and also identify and correctly use vocabulary. As they progress through the programme they see improvements in scores which later feed into improvements in Reading Ages. Teachers celebrate every success with students, from small quiz score improvements to large leaps in reading age.

It is this celebration of reading which feeds into the second edict - reading for pleasure. This year the English department has split its focus to allow us to encourage students to read, not only to jump through academic hoops but also for the simple pleasure a good book can bring. Working closely with our excellent librarian, we are constantly looking for new and interesting texts to hook our students and get them fired up about reading. As Stephen King once said, "books are a uniquely portable magic" and, here at Smithdon, we take responsibility for sharing as much of that magic with our students as we can.



National Poetry Day

National Poetry Day is an annual, UK- wide celebration of poetry. The theme for 2021 was CHOICE. English classes paused perspective, stopped story and context, retired representation for the day and advocated for more appreciation of the written (and spoken) word. National Poetry Day usurped English lessons on Thursday, 7th October and we celebrated verse. Here's a sampling of what students enjoyed and created:



Gillian Clarke

This half term, Smithdon High School has been fortunate enough to have the famous poet, Gillian Clarke, visit the school and talk to the whole of Year 11. It was a real privilege to hear her and also very helpful in our work on our English Literature GCSE. Four lucky pupils were selected to interview Gillian Clarke, the former Welsh Poet Laureate, whose poetry we had studied in Year 10.

Gillian Clarke's poems have often been set as exam pieces and she said how nice it was to be back in a school, talking about her love of poetry. She also mentioned her thanks to her high school English teacher who made the class "write an essay every week" and concluded with wishes of good luck to the whole of Year 11 for our forthcoming GCSEs.



Speaking about her poem, "The Habit of Light," which we had all studied in Year 10, Gillian explained how it was written about her mother after she died and said that her mother would probably be "embarrassed" by the rather vain way that she was presented to the reader; however, Gillian loved being able to create the poem and show how her mother cast an aura of light about her, as well as how it reminded her of home.

When we asked about the writing process, Gillian explained that a favourite part is when she might have "a sudden urge" to write down a first line and she explained that sometimes when she is writing she "just can't stop," and she described the excitement of capturing ideas. Behind her poetry writing, she aims to tell the truth about the way we live, using ordinary language in "word music" to write about normal things. Thinking of "The Habit of Light," we asked Gillian Clarke if she had also written a poem about complete darkness, to which she replied, "I don't think I have but I shall have to consider writing one about that now." It was amazing to think that one of our questions could spark the interest of a famous poet to write another poem.

For Gillian, poetry is a positive force for life, "not an effort, but a purpose," she said, leaving us with an inspiring thought for our future studies and writing, that "anything is possible if you read."

It was a huge honour to have Gillian Clarke visit Smithdon High School and we greatly appreciate the time she spent with us in our school.

Smithdon has received the Intermediate Level International School Award from the British Council. This is in recognition of our broad and balanced curriculum as well as the ongoing links and relationship that we have with the Elite Grand School in Nepal. Mrs Bowyer has worked tirelessly with the help of some of the students to transform one of our gardens into an environmentally friendly, sensory garden.

When we think of environmental gardening, we usually think of creating a garden using natural materials, such as wood and bark chippings. But if we limit ourselves to just these sources then we miss an opportunity for creativity. In using mixed non-recyclable waste and repurposing rubbish that would otherwise end up going to landfill, we can give disposable items a second life whilst having fun and being environmentally friendly.

Our Sensory Garden introduces the philosophy of **reduce**, **reuse and recycle**. We aim to teach our students to be responsible with waste in what has become a 'throw away and replace' culture. Teaching children, when they are young, the importance of helping to save the environment will guarantee that future generations will act responsibly as they teach their children that we cannot continue to bury our waste: it is dangerous; it is polluting the water tables and we are running out of space.

Year 10 Geography Trip

The Covid-19 pandemic has prevented many school trips, including Geography fieldwork. The Geography department were delighted to take all 70 Year 10 Geographers on their coastal fieldtrip on Wednesday 13 October. Students were accompanied by Mr. Chapman, Ms. Bazeley-Smith, Mr. Duncan, Mrs. Nash-Pay and Miss Drewery.

Our first location was Mundesley where we observed the striking cliffs made of glacial till, deposited after the last ice age. Students sketched and photographed the cliffs as well as measuring the angle of the slope of the beach. We also looked at the effects of erosion on the sediment characteristics found on the beach. Mundesley is facing coastal erosion, making it an ideal place to study the various sea defenses in place along this stretch of coastline.



We visited Sheringham where students listened to a talk on sea defenses by Mr. Chapman, who talked about why Sheringham is heavily defended by a range of coastal sea defenses. Everyone visited Sheringham High Street with most taking the opportunity to enjoy some fish and chips and ice cream.

Our final location was Cley-next-the-Sea with its steep shingle beach and salt marsh, where students carried out more surveys. All the data collected will be used as students prepare for their Geographical Investigations exam which they will sit in the Summer of 2023.






It was a pleasure to take this group of hard working Geographers to these locations, and the department is looking forward to more fieldwork later in the year.

Match report: Smithdon Vs. St Clement's

Smithdon Year7 football team played their first match for the school on Wednesday 13 October against St Clement's High School.

The boys were nervous as they warmed up but come the start of the match they had settled and were looking forward to playing.

Smithdon kicked off the first half, passed the ball well and looked to apply pressure. St Clement's soaked the pressure up well and got into the match. The first scare came when St Clement's countered and broke the Smithdon back line hitting the inside of the post with the ball flying back out. Smithdon then took the lead. Seal, who hit a long and wide goal kick, provided an assist for Lucas who gambled well, picked the ball up and ran directly towards goal where he beat a player and smashed the ball across goal, hitting the inside of the post and in. The goal provided the confidence for the team to really push on and Smithdon started to take control of the match. Both the defence and midfield were battling well and this led to the second goal. Smithdon won a throw-in in the final third and made full use of it. The throw-in led to a scuffle in the box and the ball landing at the feet of Josh, who had an easy tap in to make it 2-0. The game became a little messy after the second goal with both teams giving away possession and both keepers having to make a string of good saves as well as a goal being disallowed for offside.

Half time: Smithdon 2 – 0 St Clement's

The second half started with St Clement's on top and they took advantage of this. They played some nice passes to create an opening for their strike. Seal produced a good save but the ball fell to their player who just got enough on it for it to roll over the line to make the score 2-1.

The boys didn't let this affect them as they got their composure back and went on the attack. The ball was played down the left wing where Josh cut it back to Jack, who tried his luck from about 25 yards. The keeper seemed to have it covered but only managed to parry it into his top corner, for Smithdon to restore their two goal lead to make the score 3-1.

The game became a bit scrappy, with no team making their possession count or really creating any clear opportunities. Smithdon then saw a very clever through ball from George to play in Lucas, who still had a lot to do. Lucas again drove towards the goal and with some magical dribbling he managed to beat 4 players, get one-on-one with the keeper and he coolly slotted the ball between the his legs to make the score 4-1. Smithdon took their foot off the gas for a 10-minute spell where St Clement's had a number of good chances with Seal keeping his concentration and pulling off a number of good one-on-one saves to keep the lead intact. Smithdon then finished the game off. Again Seal used his long kick to play Lucas in behind who calmly slotted the ball home to complete his first hat trick and making the score 5-1 to Smithdon.

A massive well done to Terrington St Clements.





The Musical




Tegan and Summer in Year 9 are our choreographers for the show. They both attend dance lessons out of school so are very experienced and trained.


