SMITHDON IN THE NEWS

Smithdon's art installation makes a splash...

Budding young artists at Smithdon High School showed they are back in the 'swim' of things after the restrictions of Covid with an installation that features a shoal of sparkling fish, each bearing a positive message.

Working with artist Jessica Perry from the North West Norfolk Arts Society that funded the installation, Year 7 students designed and created the laser-cut fish, which included words relating to coming back to school and reforming their community, as well as being back out and about in the community following the relaxation of Covid rules.

The fish cascaded from the ceiling of the main hall to form the centrepiece of an art exhibition with a theme of *Revive*. The Installation's permanent home will now be in the middle of the atrium within the school's Shaw Building, where the fish will be able to catch the light as they move in the air.

Year 7 students contributed mono-prints, while Year 8 created ink drawings, lino prints, and colour pencil drawings, and Year 9 produced Biro drawings, screen prints, and fine line drawings.

"It was our first exhibition since lockdown," said Mrs Gibbins, "The theme of Revive, following a new head of department joining Smithdon, along with the installation, meant it was the perfect time for us to fully come together to celebrate our resilience, society's changes, and the wider community of Hunstanton and the surrounding areas. It is a vital element of what we do that parents and the community are able to come into the school to witness the successes of our students and see first-hand the fantastic work that has been produced."

She added that creativity has long been championed by the West Norfolk Academies Trust, of which Smithdon is part, with students encouraged to express themselves through art, design technology, photography and textiles.

The number of students going on to study art-based subjects in further education has more than tripled over the past three years.

Miss Phelps, Head of Art, added: "I am delighted with the success of the Installation in particular and for the students to be able to work closely with an artist like Jessica."

The Nashville duo are made up of Juna N Joey and have kicked off their summer with their latest single which was released in June.

Not just any old tour, the duo have been going around schools, including West Norfolk and across the country, playing a performance as well as doing a talk on mental health and bullying issues that are so prevalent in young people. *More Than A Maybe* is an upbeat hit which evokes memories of high-school romances.

At such a young age, the pair are already doing admirable and inspirational things. Feeling a sense of duty, Juna N Joey will be using their platform to speak out about these issues, helping to create an awareness in young audiences that have that sense of relatability

They believe that mental health isn't talked about enough with children and in a time where it is only skyrocketing, more people need to take action

In addition, Juna N Joey have also become ambassadors to One Tree Planted charity, an organisation put in place to help plant trees where they are needed most.

Originally from West Palm Beach, Florida, and now having become Nashville recording artists, the duo has amassed some 11 million views and 1.5 million likes on TikTok.

The students at Smithdon danced and clapped along with the music. There was also a chance to buy some merchandise and pose for photos and receive autographs from the inspirational duo.

This was an amazing and unique opportunity for the students to meet and converse with young people from across the pond!





It was great to celebrate our students' end of schooling at Smithdon High School.





































Nous sommes allés en France!

In the very early hours of July 1st, 30 students and 4 members of staff set off for France on our first school trip abroad since 2019. It had been quite a feat getting ourselves even this far, with last-minute scrambles for passports, Covid passes and Covid tests, so everyone was very excited as we left (once the bus had arrived at the right school!). First stop was Springwood, where the bus picked up their 29 students and 4 staff, then off we went to France.

We crossed the Channel by ferry from Dover to Calais and for many of us this was our first time abroad, so even the ferry trip was exciting. The open air deck was very popular on such a clear, hot day and the views were superb. Arriving in France, we headed for the beach at Berck-sur-Mer, a seaside town with gorgeous white sandy beaches, and many of us practised our French by buying ice-creams or crêpes. (Did those people at the ice cream stall really not speak English or had they been tipped off by the teachers?) Then it was on to the château for an evening meal, settling in to the pod village and free time to relax.

Saturday was our big day in Paris and that was fantastic (or, as we French-speakers say, c'était fantastique!). First stop was Montmartre, walking up all the steps (and there were hundreds!) to la Cathédrale de Sacre-Coeur, then being able to look over the whole of Paris. Montmartre is filled with little shops and cafés, so there were plenty of opportunities to practise our French again, buying souvenirs and, of course, more crêpes.

Then it was on to the Tour Monparnasse. The tower has 60 floors and some people were a little nervous about going up in the lifts, so a few of the boys helped out by speculating what it would be like if the lifts failed. Merci beaucoup! Apparently, one of the Springwood boys began

to scream the moment the lift doors closed...luckily, none of us were in that lift! The view from the top of the tower is breathtaking: there is a glass-sided viewing platform and you can see across the whole of Paris, including the Eiffel Tower. After that it was picnic time by the Eiffel Tower, followed by a boat trip on a bateau-mouche.


On Sunday morning, we went to Accrobranche - the French version of 'Go Ape'. There were different levels of difficulty for this and the staff had a go too. The final part of the hardest level was a zip wire over the lake, though some people had already chickened out when they had to climb up the rope ladder into the trees! After lunch back at the château, we went for a walk around the local town, Montdidier, some of us ending up with a spending spree in the supermarché (and more French speaking). On the way back, we stopped at one of the many WW1 cemeteries, where we saw the graves of both French and German soldiers. It was a very moving experience, being able to see in reality what we'd learnt about in History back in school.

Our final visit on the trip was to a chocolate factory, as we drove to Calais on Monday. The master chocolatier gave us a demonstration of how the chocolate is made and there were samples to try afterwards too - the factory had a shop too which was very popular, of course!

We arrived back at Smithdon late on Monday evening. It was a fabulous trip and we were all really pleased to have had the opportunity to travel to France. Thanks to everyone for making it so memorable!


On Saturday, we spent the day in Paris...







We have enjoyed a fantastic year in the allotment garden!


With the help of Matt and Poppy from the Papillon project we have turned what was a disused space into a fabulous and productive garden.



The Farm to Fork Trip

On arrival at Holkham Hall, we were greeted by the staff who were ready to take us to our first activity. As it was such a big group we split into two groups. Mrs Nash and Mrs Coe went with the Year 10's and myself and Mr



Ashwell took the Year 9 to the wonderful walled-garden where Head Chef Michael Chamberlain, who works in The Victoria Inn, was there to take us on a tour of the fruit and vegetable gardens.

We wandered around with Michael telling us about what they grow and how they use the produce in The Victoria Inn. He then asked us questions, to which some of the students answered and impressed me with their great knowledge on seasonal produce. We then headed to the Education Shed to watch Head Chef Michael butcher a Muntjac deer that had been caught on the estate. He explained the importance of seasonal foods and how to avoid wasting anything that had been caught, reared or grown on the estate. The students listened so intently you could have heard a pin drop in the shed. Whilst talking to us Head Chef Michael expertly portioned the Muntjac and gave examples of how each cut will be used in future dishes. He then cooked the loin for all the students to try. I was pleasantly surprised to see so many of the students try it and indeed like it!

After the question and answer session we stopped for lunch and got to enjoy the cafe and courtyard area.

Our second activity was all about the produce that is grown and reared on the estate and how and where this takes place. We had a look around the farm to fork museum and watched a video on what is produced on the farm. Following these we were lucky enough to go on the guided tractor-trailer tour around the estate.

All aspects of the farm were pointed out to us as we got to see parts of the estate not usually seen on your everyday visit. From a teaching point of view it was a really great experience for the students to see in real life what farm to fork really means. Not only did the students and I learn so much but it was also a wonderful day and an experience that we will be offering to our future groups.

The students thoroughly enjoyed themselves and were extremely well behaved - they made Smithdon High School proud. A big THANK YOU to all the students and staff for making the day a wonderful experience.

Geography Field Trip

All Year 10 Geographers took part in our annual Norwich field day on Wednesday 29 June. Students were accompanied by Mr Chapman, Ms Bazeley-Smith, Mrs Johnson, Mr Duncan and Mrs Nash-Pay.

On arrival in Norwich, we carried out a range of urban fieldwork techniques including traffic counts, pedestrian counts, questionnaires, land use surveys and environmental quality surveys.

Students also enjoyed the open top bus tour of Norwich operated by City Sightseeing. The 45 minute tour took us all over Norwich with views of the castle, cathedral, the river Wensum, the railway station and Norwich City Football Club. The highlight of the trip was a journey up Mousehold Heath to experience an amazing view across the city.

An attraction for Norwich this summer is the GoGoDiscover Trail in association with Break. Some students took the opportunity to have their photograph taken with one of the 55 large T.Rex dinosaurs which can be found in Norwich until 10 September 2022

The Cambridge Writing Prize

The Cambridge Writing Prize is open to students at selected schools in Norfolk.

Year 9 students were invited to submit a critical analysis of one or more of the BBC shortlisted Short Stories.

Students who submitted an essay to the competition travelled to Cambridge on Tuesday 5 July where they attended a lecture, met current undergraduates at Gonville and Caius College, and enjoyed lunch in a traditional college dining hall.

On Tuesday 5 July, a few talented students earned the opportunity to attend an English literature event at Cambridge University for the day!

Recently, Year 9 students had the task of writing a critical analysis on the short story, Scrimshaw, by Elley Williams. The most intellectual and fascinating pieces were forwarded to 4 judges, who approved the final pieces for eventual selection.

Once we arrived at Cambridge, we were immediately escorted to the hall to be introduced to Cambridge University and what it's like to study there. We were introduced to the courses available at Cambridge, such as the arts and humanities, sciences and, most importantly, English.

Throughout the day, we attended Q&As with current students of Cambridge and we gained lots of useful information with regards to everyday life, finances and timetables. We also were given a tour of one of the

colleges, which was awesome to see. My favourite part of the tour was the massive library, holding books ranging from fiction to fact.

After lunch, we came to our final two events of the day; a lecture on *Macbeth* and, the most exciting bit, the winner of the Cambridge shortlist prize!







She explained how her life-changing experience of being diagnosed with Breast Cancer encouraged her to support a Charity called Flat Friends which supports those who do not wish to have the reconstructive surgery. Sarah linked this to how consultation is important and communication.






