## Smithdon's new academic year welcomes a new Headteacher!

## Smithdon's Head Students pay respects to The Few.

On 3 October, a service to remember those who fought in the Battle of Britain took place in King Lynn's Tower Gardens.

The service was led by the Reverend Canon Mark Dimond and it commemorated the fallen who served in the air strike during World War II.

Smithdon's Head Students, Tommy and Olivia, joined the Senior Prefects from Springwood, Marshland and St. Clements in representing the Trust's Schools.

Veteran Phillip Ward, aged 97, served in the second world war and spoke to the young people about his experience. Airmen who fought the battle, entirely by the air forces, are known as *The Few*. Mr Ward is the only surviving member of the 9<sup>th</sup> Parachute Regiment serving in Normandy.

The Mayor for West Norfolk, Lesley Bambridge, said, *"This is another important anniversary that shouldn't be forgotten. It was good to see children from Howard Junior School and from Schools in the West Norfolk Academy Trust group: Smithdon, Marshland, Springwood and St Clement's High Schools."*

Smithdon is always proud to commemorate and pay our respects to all those that fought and defended our country and freedom.

The Drama Club gave some sneak previews rehearsing for Oliver JR and the PE Clubs gave demonstrations in basketball, football and table tennis.




A shoal of fish was chosen to metaphorically represent our coastal and student community. Using the newly-installed laser-cutter, the fish were cut using transparent acrylic. The installation was then put together by the Art ambassadors, guests and staff at the exhibition.

# Remembering Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

Elizabeth Alexandra Mary Windsor was born on 21 April 1926 in Mayfair, London. Her parents were King George VI and Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon (The Queen Mother). When Princess Elizabeth was four years old, her sister Princess Margaret was born.

Princess Elizabeth was 13 years old when WW2 broke out and too young to help at first but in the last few months, she served as a mechanic and truck driver to support her country which she soon would rule.

In 1952, King George VI passed away leaving 25 year old Elizabeth as heir to the throne. She was crowned Queen of England in 1953. Throughout her life, she visited 117 countries and ruled 32 independent countries during her reign although not all at once.

Queen Elizabeth always had a passion for dogs, especially Corgis. It began in 1933 when her father brought home a Corgi named Dookie. She went on to own 30 Corgis in her lifetime as well as creating a dog breed named the 'Dorgi' which was a mix of a Dachshund and a Corgi.

Another of her passions were horses.

Queen Elizabeth II first rode a horse

at the age of three before getting her own Shetland called Peggy when she was 4. She attended many different horse shows and owned many different horses. Her pony, Emma, was seen during the funeral procession.

Queen Elizabeth served a long reign. She was the only English Monarch to reach their 70th Jubilee - her platinum jubilee marked a momentous occasion! She died on 8 September 2022 aged 96. Her funeral was on the 19th September.

For around one week, people from all around the world travelled to queue outside Westminster Hall to see the Queen's coffin and pay their respects. From there her coffin was taken to Westminster Abbey. During the funeral, the coffin was carefully placed on the back of an old gun cart (as tradition). This heavy cart was pulled by around 98 Navy seamen.

Queen Elizabeth II was our only Queen and monarch. I never realised how much of an impact she had on my life until it was too late. She was a role model to so many people and lived through so many historical events including WW2.

From the day I was born she ruled my home country. Now that Queen Elizabeth II is gone, a strange

feeling of loss and sadness (different from normal loss) came over me. I was fortunate enough to have the chance to visit and lay down flowers at one of the royal estates, Sandringham. It was clear from the many flowers laid down that so many people loved our Queen dearly. She was and will always be a special lady.

Personally, Queen Elizabeth was an inspiration to me. She was my first ever Queen. She travelled the world and met so many people. She made countless appearances on TV. On top of this she served alongside 15 Prime Ministers (one of which is the new Prime Minister, Liz Truss.)

Altogether we both think Queen Elizabeth was a great role-model who everyone can learn from, now and in the future.

The day of meeting the Queen is now 22 years ago. Planning for the visit of Her Majesty took weeks. I was selected to be one of the staff to meet the Queen. My job at the time was Assistant Director of Sixth Form. One of my responsibilities was working with the Sixth Form Council. The Queen was to drop in to one of their meetings to see democracy in action.

On the day of the visit, the Queen made her way along D Block with Ms Shaw to officially open the new CLS area (now Miss Cowles' classroom) and the new library. They eventually came to us where we were based in one of the rooms in the English corridors. I remember shaking her hand before she continued her visit. This was a very proud moment and a memory of my time at Smithdon High School that I will never forget.




Jacob has used colour and illustrations to create his poem - and a lot of black ink!


