Smithdon student's sporting success!



One of Smithdon's students has been celebrating after representing both Smithdon and Norfolk at the Anglian Schools Cross Country Championships in Northampton.

Faith, a Year 7 student, qualified for the championships by ranking highly in a series of qualifying events. Faith began her winning streak when she came first in our school's cross-country competition, before progressing to the West Norfolk Schools Cross Country event, where she placed second.

She then made the top 10 in the next Norfolk Schools' event. She went on to finish in the top third of runners in the Anglian Championships, where she was also in the top 8 of runners representing Norfolk.

Smithdon's Head of PE, Mr Ward, stated, "Faith was the only representative from Smithdon that qualified for the event, but there were a large number of students from schools around the Anglian region of the country. It is an amazing achievement for Faith to have finished where she did, and the school is very proud of her achievements."

As well as her successes as a runner, the young sports star plays netball, football and badminton at Smithdon, and, outside of school, has won prizes for her swimming and sailing.

Mr Ward continued, "Faith is a very good swimmer and has recently been moved up a swim squad due to her performances in counties' competitions – this means she is training five nights a week and shows outstanding dedication.

Faith is also a very good sailor. She recently came second in a national event in her sailing class and has also been involved in regional and county races."

He added, "At Smithdon we promote as much involvement in sport and physical activity as possible, due to the benefits it has on our students' health, but also the characteristics they can develop through being involved in sport and physical activity. However, it is also really important to us as a school to celebrate sporting success, and we are proud of the achievements of our students. Faith has been recognised in school assemblies and will be recognised with sports awards throughout the year for her achievements."

Smithdon celebrates the King's Coronation!

For the students at Smithdon, their uniforms were put to good use when they helped create a picture of the official cypher of King Charles III. The cypher is the Sovereign's monogram, consisting of the initials of the monarch's name, Charles, and title, Rex - Latin for King.

The students split into groups of red, white and blue in order to create the image on the playing field where pictures were taken with a drone to see the complete effect (see the cover page).

The blue school blazers and white shirts were joined by red sports tops to create the graphic, complete with a Union flag.

Some of us will no doubt see another coronation or two in our lifetimes. There will probably be more newspaper headlines, gossip and antiroyalists taking their stance. But, as a nation, when the Gold State Coach goes down The Mall once again, with our new monarch inside, for those few moments we will feel a sense of pride and celebration. Together we will cheer, wave our flags and feel united.



Whilst waiting for warmer weather, we decided to bring spring to the library with an Alice in Wonderland display, bringing florals and colour to the otherwise grey days of April and May.

Our Year 9 students are being encouraged to begin reading some of the 'classics' in preparation for Year 10 when they will be studying *A Christmas Carol*, a novella which was written 180 years ago. It is important that they have an understanding of the different sort of language and words that were used in the 19th Century - a world away from David Walliams!

It may seem intimidating for students to read text that they do not use daily or stories that are set in an era that doesn't represent them now in 2023 but classical literature has the opportunity to take us through a unique literary experience. It can expose us to new cultures and different historical perspectives on life, love and ancient wisdom, taking us on a journey that remains unmatched by today's social media age of curt prose and quick, one-sentence dialogue.



Classic literature is an expression of beauty in the form of literary art, imaginative prose and language that has stood the test of time and transcends eras. It continues to touch readers even today, enriching and inspiring us in numerous ways. In this age of fast-turners and quickreads, how does investing our time in a timeless literary classic change us for the better? Why do we still teach and study it?



It is common knowledge that reading as a habit helps us to improve our vocabulary and our command of the language. But classics have an edge. Their expressions and their words are something that sets them apart from modern literature. The writing style of classics is so enriching that it makes you pause and wonder about what you have just read.

But perhaps one of the greatest benefits you gain from reading classics is that it allows you to engage with the best works of the greatest minds. Like the monarchy, the past can still be relevant. After all, we are all going through the human experience, in whichever era, with whichever current world problems and whatever technological advances we have made.

Reading the classics and understanding and enjoying the prose guarantees that we do not become a society that relies on one word conversations. *1984* by George Orwell predicted that language would be deconstructed to become 'Newspeak' - a way to limit the range of human

thought so that 'Big Brother' could take absolute power over its people and fill their heads with their own doctrine, making words, language, conversations, stories and poetry no longer valid or necessary.

Thankfully, we still have Alice in Wonderland and its dreamy structure, its poetry and nonsensical language to keep us fluent in our varied and diverse language. With short tweets and quick texting now being the modern way of communicating, at least the Jabberwocky keeps us whiffling and galumphing through our frabjous days!

Eight of the team took part in the Young Enterprise Norfolk and Suffolk Area Final 2023 at the University of East Anglia on Wednesday 26 April. They were accompanied by link teachers Mr Chapman and Mrs Dibble. The team set up a trade stall before being interviewed by the judges on the journey of their company. In the afternoon, the students entered the lecture theatre along with the other teams.

The team's presentation looked at how they had tailored their products to the local market as well as giving details of the financial success of the project.

The feedback given from Young Enterprise was:

- I was impressed with your team, they absolutely held their own. I was so impressed with how relaxed and confident the students were; plus, they really have learnt how to work together well. When they stood up and did their presentation they had an informative and sincere approach which was noted by all judges.

In addition to the formal presentations and interviews, the team enjoyed a tour of the UEA, a pizza dinner and presentations from the UEA business team.

Hospitality and Catering

Our Year 9 and 10 Hospitality and Catering classes have been cooking up a storm!

Year 10 have had the chance to make the beautiful, garden-art focaccia bread that previous students have had the joy of creating. We are always impressed by the beauty of these and the creativity that is shown by our students - using vegetables to create something unique, delicious and visually interesting.

Focaccia is a traditional Italian flatbread, quite similar to pizza dough. Usually, the surface is kept pretty simple with shallow dimples poked into it and then drizzled with olive oil, salt, and dried herbs. This creates the blank surface for arranging the vegetables and herbs over the surface to create the plant and flower-like pictures. The students always have fun



making these and hopefully their parents get the chance to have a taste!

Year 10 also made the lemon meringues from scratch! Being able to practise all the varied recipes and techniques will help them to prepare for their final GCSE recipe but will also teach them skills that they will benefit from for the rest of their lives - even without wanting a career in hospitality and catering, being able to prepare food is a functional skill which they can all take into adulthood.

Not leaving Year 9 out...the homemade burgers they made smelt, looked and tasted delicious. It is important that the students learn how to cook from scratch using fresh ingredients. They chose their own fillings to personalise them and make them unique for their own taste and preferences.



Geography The Volcanic Eruption



Mrs Johnson's Year 8 Geography class had a lot of fun whilst learning about Tectonics. They thought they would try to see if they could create their own volcanic eruption using everyday ingredients!

Crystal made the volcano with a bottle, paper and glue and then the group used washing up liquid, baking powder, water, food colouring and vinegar to create the lava.

Intermediate Mathematical Challenge

Every year, Smithdon students from across both Key Stages are selected to enter the UKMT (United Kingdom Mathematics Trust) Maths Challenges.

In April, our top set students in Years 7 and 8 were selected to participate in this year's UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge.

"The Junior Mathematical Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple choice competition aimed at students across the UK.

It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

The problems are designed to make students think. Most are accessible, yet still challenge those with experience". (UKMT)

The thresholds for certificates this year were:

82+ - Gold 66+ - Silver 52+ - Bronze
